BIBLE STUDY



STARTER: What do you think the perfect family looks like?

Read Genesis 37

THE FAMILY

- What impression do you get of the family in this story?
- Look at the passages where Jacob is mentioned in this story.
 Do you think Jacob was a loving father? Why or why not? (note: the long sleeves on Joseph's coat signified that he was not intended to go and work in the fields as the rest of his brothers did but had a higher status of overseer).
- Look at all the passages where we see Joseph in the chapter.
 Do you think Joseph was a loving brother or son? Why or why not?
- What does the story teach us about how God works in dysfunctional situations?



Remember that even Jesus came from a tough family background. Don't feel that your less-than- perfect family situation means that God can't work in you.

The Dreamer - Genesis 37

BIBLE STUDY



THE DREAMS

- God speaks through dreams but not all dreams are a message from God! If you
 think your dream is from God, pray about it, talk and pray with a wise Christian
 friend, and ask God to confirm it. But remember that in general, God doesn't
 use dreams to communicate as much as other ways. What might some of
 those other ways be?
- Joseph seemed to recognise that his dreams were significant. Should he have kept them to himself for the sake of peace and humility, or did he do well to declare it to his family?
- Verse 11 tells us that Jacob 'kept the matter in mind'. How in particular might
 he have been thinking bearing in mind his past experience with dreams being
 sent from God (Genesis 28: 10-22)?



Discuss what are the things to bear in mind in sharing what we believe to come from God, especially with those who are in a more difficult place.

The Dreamer - Genesis 37

GOING DEEPER

Compare Genesis 37:18-20 to James 1:15.

How could the brothers have stopped their desire before it led to sin?

Later in Genesis 37:26, Judah presents an alternative to killing Joseph that seems to benefit everybody (the brothers make money and Joseph gets to live) but it was really deceit.

Sin always presents itself as a beneficial alternative, but inevitably leads to regret. Why, then, do we fall for its lies? How might we, like Judah, justify sinning?



As we make our way through these chapters looking at the life of Joseph, we will be considering how he gives us a picture of Jesus.

In what ways is Joseph like Jesus in this chapter? In which ways is he different?

Up and Down - Genesis 39

BIBLE STUDY



STARTER:

Do you think our spiritual growth is something we are aware of? How might we monitor it?

Read Genesis 39

We join Joseph in Egypt, now working in an Egyptian official's house.

- Look at verse 2. Do you think the two clauses 'the Lord was with Joseph' and 'he prospered' are linked? Look at Deuteronomy 29:9. Do you think we always prosper as a result of God being with us?
- Verse 3 How might people observe that the Lord is with us when we work? (it's not always about 'being successful at everything we do'!)



Up and Down - Genesis 39

BIBLE STUDY



- In an age of health and safety, we are always clearly notified of fire exits and
 escape routes when we attend any event with potential for disaster. Joseph
 was very careful to avoid being drawn into an affair with Potiphar's wife in this
 chapter.
- Look at 1 Corinthians 10: 13. If you feel able to do so, talk about which areas of your life you might need to plan better 'escape routes'.
- Temptation is obviously something that we can't completely avoid, but we can be prepared. How might we be so? How can we support each other as a group?



Up and Down - Genesis 39

BIBLE STUDY



- Joseph is changing from the lad we saw in **chapter 37**. What do you notice about his character in this chapter? Try to look at both sides of it is there anywhere he should have acted differently?
- If Joseph was the same person as in chapter 37, do you think he would have been so highly regarded – both by Potiphar and by the prison warder?
- What do you think specifically had changed as 'the Lord was with him'.
 Think about how you might humanly have expected him to act after the journey he had been on.



GOING DEEPER

Joseph must have felt as if he was being punished for his faithfulness.

Have you ever felt a sense of injustice, believing that you are doing your best to behave correctly, only to have someone spread lies about you? Look at 1 Peter 2: 19-24 and talk about it.

Jesus continued in obedience through hardship. Where else might you have seen Joseph as a 'type' of Jesus in this chapter?

BIBLE STUDY



STARTER:

If a non-believer asked you how you continue to have faith in God even when your prayers aren't answered, what would you answer?

Read Genesis 40 & 41

Note: these are long chapters! It may be a good idea to ask your group to read them in advance of coming to the session.

Alternatively, you could divide them up into parts for different people to read to maintain interest. Whatever you decide you do need to be aware this will take a little while!



God Knows - Genesis 40 & 41

BIBLE STUDY



- In Genesis 40: 14-15, Joseph asks the cupbearer to remember him when he is himself freed. As he expectantly waits for God's deliverance, what do you think Joseph is anticipating? As verse 23 tells us, however, the cupbearer forgot him.
 - Has it ever happened to you that you have interpreted something as an answer to prayer - with all the doors opening - only to have it not work out?
 - What might we learn from Joseph's story about how God operates differently from us? (See Isaiah 55:8).
- Just as in **chapter 39**, Joseph is seemingly overlooked by God. In **chapter 41 : 12**, he is simply described as 'a servant of the captain of the guard' when he had previously overseen the whole household.
 - Have you known God to bring you low spiritually, only to look back later and realise it was an opportunity for spiritual growth?



God Knows - Genesis 40 & 41

BIBLE STUDY



- We have already talked a little about dreams and their significance when we looked at Joseph's dreams in Genesis 37. Several years later, Joseph understands dreams from a more mature perspective (see 40:8).
 - Have you experienced a similar realisation of God as the great choreographer working behind the scenes of your life?
- The rollercoaster continues and Joseph is finally summoned by Pharoah (41:14).
 - What does the Bible repeatedly reassure us when it feels as if God has
 forgotten us? (Look back at chapter 39: 2,3,21,23 to see examples in this
 particular story).
 - What other promises do you hold on to when life feels desperately hard?

- Look at 1 Peter 5: 6. What does it mean for us to walk in trust? Can you think of practical examples?
- In what ways do you see Joseph as a type of Jesus in this week's story? When did Jesus walk in trust?

BIBLE STUDY



STARTER:

Think about crossroads moments in your life, which have changed its direction.

Today's chapter is a 'crossroads' moment in Joseph's life.

Many years have passed since he last saw his brothers.

Then circumstances interweave with God's overseeing of events to bring about a meeting between them.

Read Genesis 42

(If it has worked well for your group to read these passages in dramatized parts, you could do so here)

- Look at verse 6. What do you think was going through Joseph's mind as he recognised his brothers?
- Look at Gen 37:7. How did his dream from chapter 37 come true before Joseph's eyes?
- Remember the second dream? (Gen 37:9). Do you think this may have influenced what Joseph asked of his brothers? (v12 & v20).

BIBLE STUDY




- Does it surprise you that Joseph was so harsh with the brothers he had not seen for about 20 years? When did they last see each other what were the circumstances? (Gen 37: 28).
- Do you think we see ways in this chapter that Joseph had it in mind to forgive his brothers?
- In verse 21, we are given a detail missing from what happened in chapter 37.
 - What did the brothers confess that has not been revealed to the reader before?
 - Why do you think they were remembering this episode from their past, since they did not recognise Joseph?
- What do you think it might have meant to Joseph to hear them talking about this painful episode in the way they did?
- How did Jacob and the brothers react to the returned silver? Why had Joseph returned it?

GOING DEEPER

- One commentary says 'Joseph's brothers were trapped by their past'.
- Look at Matthew 7: 2 and Galatians 6:7.
- What do these verses teach us about the consequences of our actions?
 Can you think of any examples where this has been shown to be true in the news or in our personal lives?
- We have been thinking about how Joseph is a 'type' of Jesus. Can you see places here where Joseph and Jesus walk similar paths?


The long road of reconciliation - Genesis 43

STARTER:

What are some of the ways God uses to soften hard hearts?

Read: Genesis 43

- Look at verse 2. How do you think God was using the ongoing situation to speak to Jacob the patriarch? In your experience, when life gets very tough, does it cause you to doubt God?
- Jacob was a follower of God, with personal experience of God's leading and forgiveness. He almost certainly prayed for the famine to end, but God didn't answer.
 - What might we learn from this chapter about why God sometimes says no to our prayers?
 - Do you have experience of God seeming to ignore your prayers, only to look back and see he had another plan?




BIBLE STUDY



The long road of reconciliation - Genesis 43

- Talk about the transformation of Judah from Gen 37: 27 (and chapter 38)
 to the man who offers to act as a guarantee for Benjamin's safety in
 verses 8-10.
 - What do you think caused the softening of Judah's hard heart?
- Look at Jacob's approach in verse 14 'If I am bereaved, I am bereaved'.
 - Do you have sympathy with Jacob's rather fatalistic approach here?
 How do you think we ourselves can change from a 'shrug of the shoulders' approach to life, to one that is built on trust in God's promises?
 - Look at verse 23. What is interesting about the steward's words as he talks to these Israelites, followers of the one true God?



As we look back over this chapter, where do you think Joseph may have noticed the biggest change in the brothers who sold him into slavery?

The long road of reconciliation - Genesis 43

GOING DEEPER

In **verse 16**, we understand with our Western eyes that Joseph is simply inviting his brothers for a meal. But far more than that, this hospitality is an invitation to relationship.

Read Luke 19: 1-10 to see the impact it had on a New Testament seeker, and Revelation 3: 20 to understand the significance of Jesus' desire for us.

Where else do we see Joseph as a 'type' of Jesus here? Think about how grace is shown in today's story, for example.

When are the times when you feel God's love the most – when you're praying, serving him, reading the Bible, or during hard times? Why do you think this is true?

STARTER:

This is a starter and a finisher as we come to the end of our series....so you can decide when you spend time thinking about it in your group today.

What do you think you have come to appreciate most about God through the story of Joseph?

Read: Genesis 44: 1-21

- Do you think Joseph's brothers needed to be tested? Why?
- Can you think of other places in the Bible where God works through testing?
 - Why do we think he uses testing as a means to help our faith to grow?
 Look at 1 Peter 1: 6-7.
 - What are some practices that mean we pass our tests instead of failing them?

BIBLE STUDY



Read: Genesis 44: 22-30

- We already know the details of this story from earlier in the book of Genesis.
 - Why do you think it is included again here?
 - What do you think we (and Joseph) learn about Judah from this story?



Read: Genesis 45: 1-15

- Looking at verses 5-8, how does Joseph bring God into the story of what has happened to him?
- Flick back through the chapters we have looked at in the last few weeks (from chapter 37). Think not only about the events going on in today's chapter but about the places where God has been mentioned in previous chapters.
 - Why is Joseph able to talk about God in these verses in the way he does, instead of feeling bitter for the years that have been lost?

BIBLE STUDY



Read: Genesis 45: 25-28

Think about Jacob.

- He begins the final episode in the story of Joseph by asking the brothers to go and buy food (at the start of chapters 42 and 43).
 Now, at the end of chapter 45, we see him preparing to be reunited with the son who he thought had been lost.
- Jacob is known as one of the great patriarchs of the Old
 Testament (Abraham, Isaac and Jacob). When you consider his
 role in the story of Joseph, and his treatment of various members
 of his family, does this astonish you? What does it teach us
 about our never-changing God?

GOING DEEPER

Look forward to **Genesis 50 : 20**. This verse is a reminder of the great redemption plan of our God. Could you explain the gospel plan of redemption in simple language if someone asked you to do so?

Are you able to look back over your life and see places where God has 'redeemed' that which seemed lost? How does he work redemptively in the lives of us as believers?

Talk about how sharing our testimony can be a blessing to others who are trapped in their past.

Thinking about redemption, how is Joseph a picture of Jesus in this part of the story?

You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives.
